SHEPHERDS SPENT FIRST 5 MONTHS ALONE IN YARD, FOUND THEIR PUPPYHOOD AND HEALTH AT AHS

These sweet, innocent dogs had no idea what it was like to enjoy human companionship, have fun and play, or to just be puppies.

In time, and with lots of reassurance, we were able to build their confi-

dence and help them overcome their fears. One by one, they slowly emerged, wagging their tails and playing! We are so happy to say that five of the six are now in wonderful, loving homes, and

AHS RESCUES EMACIATED, 5-MONTH-OLD PETUNIA AND HELPS HER BLOOM

Newark Animal Control received a call on August 19th to go to the Grafton Ave. apartment complex to retrieve an abandoned puppy. A witness saw a car pull in, assuming they were dumping trash, but instead, saw a puppy tied to the fence.

The severely neglected pup was taken immediately to our medical dept. where our veterinarian estimated her to be approximately five months old. She weighed just 10 pounds and was covered in urine, feces, and blood. Extremely dehydrated, she was immediately administered fluids. Further examination revealed numerous puncture wounds and teeth in very poor condition for such a young dog. Despite all of this, she had a strong

appetite and was very responsive to staff's attention.



Tied to a fence and abandoned, the 10 pound puppy was severely neglected, but had a healthy appetite for both food and human companionship.

Named Petunia, she was initially cared for in one of our administrative offices, resting comfortably on a pile of soft blankets. Regardless of past trauma, she had the sweetest disposition, happpily greeting staff members with kisses, and craving to be held.

When Petunia's health was stable enough to no longer need daily veterinary care, she was transferred to a devoted foster home who continued the love and good care she'd finally come to know. She was spoiled and cuddled, and in just two weeks from her rescue, Petunia had gained 15 pounds. Soon she was available for adoption!

We are happy to announce that Petunia found a wonderful home in September with the Palmer family in Bangor PA. Barely recognizable as the emaciated waif who arrived in August, Petunia is finally living the good life she deserves.

Huck came to our Tinton Falls shelter from a high risk shelter in the South. When he first arrived, one of our wonderful volunteers, who has over 24 years in Law Enforcement, noticed that Huck was something special.

Huck showed strong tracking instincts and appeared to have a very talented nose! Our volunteer immediately reached out to some of her colleagues, and was put in contact with the Cape May County Sheriff's Department, who runs an excellent Bloodhound Training Academy for dogs just like Huck.

The Cape May Sheriff's Department put us in contact with the Abington Police Department in Pennsylvania. They were actively seeking a Bloodhound to add to their force, which would be the first Bloodhound for their department! The Cape May Sheriff's Department and the Abington Police Department both planned a meeting with Huck at our shelter in Tinton Falls.

People of all ages came down to our Newark shelter to help out.

On September 1st, 2021 Hurricane Ida wreaked havoc on our Newark Shelter. AHS Newark took on about three feet of water and was left without power for two days. Thankfully, the flooding did not affect the animals in our care. Staff worked day and night to ensure that our animals were safe, comfortable, and well cared for as our basement continued to flood.

The flooding unfortunately damaged our washers, dryers, and dish washers. We lost almost all of our dog & cat food due to water damage. We immediately put out a plea to our wonderful supporters for help. The outpouring of support we received from the community was so heartwarming! Our Wishlist was shared countless times, and hundreds of bags of dog food, cat



food, canned food, toys, and treats were delivered over the next few days. Amazon alone made three truckloads of deliveries in just one day!

We're so grateful and overwhelmed by the support of our community. Once the power was restored, we were able to pump out the water from the basement and start to rebuild what we lost. We thank all of our donors for their support!



IRONBOUND CATS ARE TOUGH AS NAILS! AHS Offers Career Cats Program To Get Cats Off The Streets



Associated Humane Societies Newark is taking a hands-on approach to assist some atrisk felines. Periodically cats come into the shelter from areas or situations that they are not able to be TNVR (trap, neuter, vaccinate, return). AHS has enlisted Emma Dolan, with over 25 years of community cat experience, to create alternative adoption options for cats from these unique circumstances. Over the last few months, AHS has developed a Career Cats program,

in addition to our already existing TNVR services, to help alleviate the number of cats in our shelter. What this means for the shelter is that cats have more opportunities to find placements.

Through the Career Cats program, we've been able to relocate over 20 cats from the city streets to loving homes on farms, in barns, and even backyards with adequate shelter, food, and clean water. We have gotten very positive feedback and the cats are thriving. Often, cats that are brought into our shelter as strays are not necessarily candidates for an in-home family. These cats flourish outside and relocating them to greener pastures improves their quality of life tenfold. Each cat that goes through our program is spayed/neutered, vaccinated, microchipped and treated with a flea & tick preventative. Not only does this provide the best quality of life for these cats, but it limits their length of stay in our shelter.

Odin A very energetic stray puppy, he found the perfect home in Avenel





POPCORN PARK'S ASSISTANCE IN HIGH DEMAND FOR INJURED, TANGLED, AND TRAPPED SEAGULLS

Popcorn Park has been called out frequently over the past summer to assist seagulls that have been hooked, tangled, and trapped in fishing gear that's been discarded or left behind. Below are photos from two such cases and a third of a seagull in another sort of distress, all rescued by our AHS Animal Control Officers. These seagulls were brought back to Popcorn Park for a brief recovery period and then successfully released thanks to callers alerting us to the situations, and a prompt respone by AHS staff.

Seagull in Little Egg Harbor had a treble lure and a hook through his beak, and three more in one of his wings.



Surf City laughing gull was coated in heavy oil and trapped in a dumpster. He was brought back to Popcorn Park for degreasing, a short recovery, and later, release.





Helping Our Friends In Winter

Many animals need our help in the winter, both wildlife and cats and dogs, too. If you're providing food and water, remember to be consistent, because hungry animals will come to depend on you!



Birds and small animals

* Mixed seed is good for a variety of birds.

* Suet, which is also available in plantbased versions, provides fat, which is needed in winter.

* Peanuts are another great source of protein for some birds, squirrels and chipmunks. For birds

use a mesh feeder, or if on a tray on the ground, crush them first. * Water must always be available, so it is important that a bird bath be tended to every day, whether on a base or on the ground. Each morning, break up the ice and/or pour warm to hot water in, or use a special warmer that keeps the water above freezing.

Help cats and dogs -

* Be on the lookout for stray dogs or cats that do not belong to anyone in your neighborhood. Advise your local animal control. Animals can die in short amounts of time in freezing temperatures.

* Report dogs that are chained outside 24/7 if they do not have suitable shelter with adequate bedding and blankets. You can save a life!

BILL PAIRING PUPPIES WITH VETERANS SUFFERING WITH PTSD SIGNED INTO LAW



The PAWS act - Puppies Assisting Wounded Service members for Veterans Therapy Act, was signed into law in August by Pres. Joe Biden. The act enables military veterans suffering from PTSD to be part of a training program where they learn how to train a puppy to be a service dog, and upon successful completion of the program, they can take the dog home.

Many studies have shown the benefits of trained service dogs helping vets with PTSD.

Between 11% and 30% of veterans suffer from PTSD, and on

average, 20 vets die by suicide daily. Many studies have shown the benefits of vets working with service dogs as an effective treatment for PTSD. Although there are programs nationwide engaged in helping vets through the assistance of service dogs, this is the first national legislation to provide the means to do so.

CANINE BLOOD DONORS NEEDED TO HELP DOGS THROUGH SURGERIES

The increase in adoption of dogs during the pandemic has resulted in another unexpected increase - the need for dog blood! Veterinary hospitals may need life-saving blood to get dogs stabilized through a surgical procedure with larger dogs possibly needing several donations to get through a surgery.

Canine blood donors are not commonly heard of, but the need is real. And finding donors can be tricky as there are specific requirements. To donare blood, dogs must be between 55 and 150 pounds and 2 to 6 years old. The procedure takes about 30 minutes, but the blood donor needs a particular temperament, too.

Routinely, dogs are made comfortable on a table, enjoying tummy rubs for 10 minutes or so. A small area on the neck is shaved, a lidocaine block administered to prevent any pain, blood drawn, then lots of hugs and treats afterward. Knowing their dog can save lives makes pet parents very happy, too.

Might your pooch be a candidate? Reach out to AHS to see if blood is needed, or to the veterinary hospital in your area. It might just save a life!

ARGENTINA AIRLINE CEASES THE TRANSPORT OF HUNTING TROPHIES

Aerolíneas Argentinas announced that it will no longer carry hunting trophies on its domestic and international flights. As Argentina is one of the top ten countries importing trophies to the U.S., they have taken radical action to help protect the environment and wildlife worldwide. The U.S. is the biggest importer of wildlife trophies in the world, and New York is the biggest point of entry.

According to the Humane Society International, more than 200,000 threatened or endangered animals are killed for trophies each year. And because trophy hunters

only kill the healthiest and largest animals, that target species' population continues to decline. Therefore, airlines that support trophy transport also contribute to that species' decline.

Aerolíneas Argentinas joins other national and international airlines in their action, but some, such as Delta, United, and American, only ban the shipment of lions, leopards, elephants, rhinos, and buffalos. They continue transporting other species. Each airline, domestic or foreign, has to be looked at individually to determine their policies.

TOXIC FLEA COLLARS DROPPED BY MAJOR RETAILERS

Earlier this year, 1,700 pets died from exposure to the pesticides in Seresto flea collars. The EPA received 75,000 incident reports documenting pets harmed by the collars and did nothing. However, Seresto collars are not the only ones containing life-threatening chemicals.

PetSmart, the nation's largest pet retailer, followed by PetCo, stopped selling products containing a different dangerous pesticide, TCVP (tetrachlorvinphos). However, many other retailers, such as Hartz, Zodiac and Adams, continue to sell pet products containing this chemical.

Because the chemical residue rubs off on other surfaces, such as furniture, anyone can come in contact with these dangerous pesticides, including young children. Many organizations such as NRDC (National Resources Defense Council) continue to pressure the EPA to ban these toxic pesticides in pet products. Meanwhile, you can seek healthier alternatives to protect your pets and family.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION NOW INTRODUCED TO BAN FACTORY FARMING

While New Jersey introduced its own legislation on this subject, now the Farm System Reform Act was introduced by Rep. Ro Khanna (D-CA) in the House of Representatives (H.R. 4421) and Sen. Cory Booker (D-NJ) in the Senate (S. 2332). Supported by over 200 animal welfare, sustainable agriculture, environmental, and public health organizations—the bill would help create a food system that is better for animals, farmers, communities, and the environment by phasing out large concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs). Farmers would be given the opportunity to transition to raising animals on pasture or to crop production.

THE AMAZING TRANSFORMATION OF RINGO

PA SUPREME COURT RULES IN FAVOR OF EMOTIONAL SUPPORT DOGS

The Pennsylvania Supreme Court has ruled that a trial witness may be accompanied by a "comfort dog" if the presence of the dog will help yield "reliable, complete and truthful testimony."

Ruling unanimously in a recent murder case, the justices joined numerous other states that allow the presence of a dog to allay the fears of a witness, so long as the emotional support dog does not pose any danger to the witness and is not disruptive to the trial. Under the ruling, judges can limit any potential prejudice to a defendant by blocking jurors' view of the dog and giving appropriate jury instructions.


US SENATORS REINTRODUCE BILL TO BAN HORSE EXPORT/SLAUGHTER

The Save America's Forgotten Equines (SAFE) Act would permanently ban horse slaughter in the United States and end the export of horses for slaughter. Sponsored by New Jersey's Robert Menendez (D-NJ), and three others, and widely supported by national animal welfare organizations, the legislation would end the barbaric practice of sending horses to death, currently to Mexico and Canada. Last year, more than 35,000 horses were exported for slaughter, a practice overwhelmingly objected to by the American public. New Jersey has the second largest horse industry in the nation, second only to Kentucky.
