

GOOD NEWS! FOR ANIMALS

USDA TO REGULATE BIRDS AFTER 16 YEAR DELAY



As a result of a lawsuit brought by the American Anti-Vivisection Society (aavs.org) and the Avian Welfare Coalition, a court order requires the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture to complete rulemaking to protect birds - a process that the USDA began 16 years ago. The USDA's failure to provide coverage for these animals has

allowed birds nationwide to needlessly suffer in commercial industries covered by the Animal Welfare Act, particularly in exhibition, breeding, & the pet trade. To prevent any further delays, the court order outlines a schedule for the rulemaking process which will start with the USDA publishing a notice this summer for listening sessions. These procedures are designed to protect domestic/pet birds.

ANIMATRONIC DOLPHINS MAY REDUCE LIVE **DOLPHINS AT MARINE PARKS**

Edge Innovations, a California tech company, has built a bottlenose animatronic dolphin in order to reduce the number of real ones in captivity. It can swim for 10 hours on a single charge to mimic the look & movement of the animal. The firm hopes to eventually sell the \$40 million gadget to parks such as Sea World.

DUTCH PARLIAMENT VOTES TO SHUT DOWN 128 MINK FARMS - RELATED TO CORONAVIRUS OUTBREAKS

According to OneGreenPlanet, the Dutch Parliament voted to shut down 128 mink fur farms in response to the coronavirus outbreaks. The HSI stated "the intensive breeding of animals on fur farms is an incredibly cruel practice that not only causes immense suffering to animals but can also serve as a reservoir for corona viruses." The Dutch Parliament has said good riddance to an industry predicated on the outdated idea that exploiting, depriving & killing animals for frivolous fur fashion is acceptable. The Dutch government now has to take action to honor the Parliament's wishes.

TRADITIONAL CHINESE MEDICINE LIST TO NOW EXCLUDE PANGOLIN PRODUCTS

China has updated the newly published official list of ingredients approved for use in Traditional Chinese Medicine to exclude the sale of pangolins. This announcement follows an increase in the protection status of pangolins by the State Forestry & Grassland Administration. The pangolin is the world's most trafficked animal & international law protects all eight species. The exclusion is needed to protect critically endangered pangolins & this will be crucial to help curb illegal trade.

ALASKAN WILDLIFE IN PERIL WITH NEARLY LIMITLESS NEW HUNTING RULES

Very little will be off-limits, including the killing of mothers and cubs, whether in their dens or out. Pictured above is an Alaskan grizzly mom with her two youngsters.

Under the new National Park Service rule, effective July 9, hunting on the preserves in Alaska will be controlled by the state, which allows baiting of brown and black bears; hunting of denning black bears (including cubs) with artificial light; killing of denning wolves and coyotes (including pups); using dogs to hunt black bears; hunting of swimming caribou; and hunting of caribou from motorboats.

SICK CHINCHILLAS LANGUISH AT FARMS THAT SUPPLY U.S. RESEARCHERS

According to ScienceMag.org, a U.S. Dept. of Agriculture complaint about Moulton Chinchilla Ranch documented 85 sick, untreated chinchillas. Moulton in Chatfield, Minnesota has a 9-year record of violations & was scheduled to have a hearing which has been postponed because of the pandemic. The USDA's complaint documented an excrement ridden, unstaffed barn which housed lethargic animals with weeping

wounds, putrid abscesses, & infected eyes, swollen or crusted. In 7 of 8 inspections, the USDA found continuing violations & tight collars overlying open sores. The USDA has not filed a formal complaint against RCR (Ryerson Chinchilla Ranch) in Plymouth, Ohio for failing to disclose the existence of 1000 chinchillas & for using an "unspecified"

U.S. FISH & WILDLIFE PROPOSING EXPANDED HUNTING AND FISHING ON OUR NATIONAL WILDIFE REFUGES

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service has proposed new & expanded hunting & fishing "opportunities" at 97 national wildlife refuges & nine national fish hatcheries. The proposal would cover more than 2.3 million acres & represents the largest single expansion of hunting & fishing on federal properties in FWS history. In New Jersey, the proposal would expand existing fishing to new areas in the Edwin B. Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge — more than 47,000 acres of southern N J coastal habitats and wetlands.

ONE LUCKY LITTLE TERRAPIN



The tiny terrapin hatchling owed his life to an observant jogger who spotted him on the yellow line.

Popcorn Park comes to the aid of many diverse creatures. This little guy, a late hatching Diamondback Terrapin, was found crossing the road from his nest to the water in West Creek when a jogger spotted him on the yellow lines. He's lucky to have been rescued, as he's the same color as the pavement and drivers would not have been able to spot him. The creek he was trying

to get to was bulkheaded to he also wouldn't have been able to access the water. So the jogger brought him home. She returned later to a nearby spot on the creek without bulkheads and with enough grass and reeds to protect the turtle from the seagulls. We attempted to release him but he swam on top of the water (photo below), but without diving under he would have been a



prime target for the seagulls. A third attempt to safely release him resulted in the same outcome. We scooped him up and decided to bring him to Popcorn Park. We called Dr. John Wnek, from Project Terrapin, and made arrangements to bring the hatchling to him. Turtles usually hatch out in September but sometimes will winter over in the nest and emerge the next spring as this little guy did.



According to N. J. Nature

& Wildlife, a box turtle only roams 1 mile its whole life. Often, people, families, youngsters will find a turtle & remove it from the area/home where it should be kept. Many people think it is harmless to let their children take home a docile turtle to play with & then release it someplace they see appropriate. Please do not take them home as pets. If one is injured & needs rescue, please mark the exact spot for the wildlife center or shelter. If a turtle is in the road, you can help by moving it directly across the street in the direction it was heading.

Hope Overcame a fearful past to become a loyal, well-behaved and compassionate family girl



Suffering was nothing new to this sweet little dog, as her body shows signs of a lifetime of neglect. Her teeth are very worn down; she looks as if she's had multiple litters; and she also has some heart disease. Despite it all, Rusty is just the nicest girl, so happy to have people treat her with kindness and help her to feel well.

Rusty has a long road to recovery ahead of her, and will be under medical care for several weeks. We are hoping for a full recovery for her and are confident that Rusty's future holds a lifetime of happiness.

GLEANINGS FROM THE PANDEMIC

- There is a new pilot training program at the University School of Veterinary Medicine which may be beneficial in detecting those with the virus. The study's eight detection dogs will be exposed to COVID-19 positive saliva & urine samples for 3 weeks. Once familiar with the odor, investigators will explore if the dogs will be able to differentiate between positive & negative samples.
- In the aftermath of the global coronavirus pandemic, the Chinese government has begun to offer buyouts of 14 species of wildlife located on farms in the country. The government hopes the buyout will help these farmers transition from wildlife breeding to farming vegetables, herbs for Traditional Chinese Medicine, or more common farm animal species like chickens and pigs. The animals seized by the government face one of three fates release to the wild, relocation to a zoo or research facility, or outright culling of the animals. China hopes the proposed buyouts will reduce consumption of wildlife, some of which are thought linked to the Covid-19 pandemic by scientists, and assist with transition of these farms to more sustainable livelihoods.
- Masks & gloves are being discarded throughout the world & found on beaches & oceans. Veterinarians are attending to dogs and pups that have swallowed gloves.
- Piping plovers were listed as endangered in 1986 & the population has survived & increased due to

conservation by many partners & the cooperation of beachgoers. In NJ, the piping plover population was at 92 in 1989 and last year, 114 pairs were accounted for. According to Fish & Wildlife Service, years research confirm that when people or pets disturb plovers & other shorebirds, the birds are stressed. unable to feed, rest or

raise families, & in some cases, die.

• Due to a loss of jobs in southern India, people have turned to wildlife to make money to feed their families. According to the AP, a forensic examination of a carcass of an injured tigress showed that the creature died of a poacher's wire snare punctured its windpipe & sapped her strength as the wound festered for days. Since the country's lockdown, at least 4 tigers & 6 leopards have been killed by poachers. According to the Wildlife Justice Commission, traders were stockpiling pangolin scales in several areas of southeast Asia and smuggled to China awaiting an end to the pandemic.

HOWELL TOWNSHIP/SOMERSET COUNTY

A couple living on a farm in Somserset County stole four German Shepherd puppies that were 3 weeks old & were found living on a camper in Howell Twp. The dogs were ill & struggling to breathe & Daniel McDonald, 25, & Tricia Jaccoma, 24, did not get them medical attention. MdDonald buried two of the dead puppies, the other two into a fire pit. A necropsy showed "no indications of recent nutritional ingestion". They face multiple charges and Tricia Jaccoma has not been found. Anyone with information on Jaccoma's whereabouts are asked to contact Humane Law Enforcement Officer Michael Magliozzo of the Monmouth County SPCA AT 732-995-0329 or Patrolman Heather Scherbinski of the Howell P.D. at 732-938-4111.

EAST WINDSOR TOWNSHIP

A tractor--trailer en route to New York from Florida was involved in a fiery crash which killed 10 race horses. Nine of the horses died as a result of their injuries & a tenth horse was euthanized by a veterinarian at the scene. At least two of the horses who died had champion blood lines.

DEP PROVIDES COLOR-CODED PUBLIC HEALTH ALERTS FOR HARMFUL **ALGAE**

Last year, several dogs died in lakes & waterways impacted by harmful algae blooms or

blue-green algae. The blooms form dense mats resembling pea soup or spilled paint. The NJ Dept. of Environmental Protection has developed an index to give guidance on what recreational activities are appropriate for waterways impacted by the algae. Officials are warning the public to avoid swimming, water sports & boating lakes. Fish caught in affected streams & lakes should not be eaten & pets or livestock should not come in to contact with the waterways. In the video, Khan admitted to killing chipmunks in his backyard - a violation of state anti-cruelty laws & promoted his how-to instructional video on trapping & killing chipmunks at his Rockaway residence. The action alert was sent out by the HSUS-NJ. The video was taken down but not in time for it to be seen & saved by individuals.

NJ DEP REQUESTS PUBLIC'S HELP IN REPORTING TURTLES WITH SEVERE LESIONS TO THEIR SHELLS

In 2019 the Division of **Environmental Protection** received reports from an area of Salem County of severe lesions on the shells of northern redbellied turtles, a large basking turtle regularly seen in the central and southern portions of the state. It's not clear if turtles in any other areas are affected. The DEP is actively investigating the cause and need the public's help.



Please send reports of any turtle species with lesions

to Brian Zarate at Brian.Zarate@dep.nj.gov. Please include specific information on where the turtle was found, when, how many turtles you saw and any other observations that may be relevant (abnormal behavior, water conditions, dead fish/amphibians in the area). The Division appreciates the cooperation of the public and "citizen scientists."

ANIMAL RIGHTS GROUPS FORM COALITION FOR JUSTICE IN OCEAN COUNTY

A group named the New Jersey Animal Advocacy Coalition (NJAAC) is working to gain justice for a number of animal abuse cases in Ocean County. Members include the Lacey Raccoon Task Force, NJ Animal Save Movement, NJ HSUS, Animal Protection League, NJ League of Humane Voters, Friends of Animals United & Jersey Shore Wildlife Rescue. A horrific death of a raccoon by a Lacey teenager was noted with a rally in front of the offices of the Ocean County Prosecutors Office.

They also seek justice for three dogs, Kobe, Gizmo & Fred, who were left in a Lacey home where they languished & died of dehydration & starvation. Owner Alissa DeStefano had been visited by an ACO employed by Academy Pest Control who responded to a complaint. DeStefano was given the opportunity to relinquish the care to the authorities but she chose to abandon her dogs & her home. NJAAC maintains that DeStefano had at least two opportunities to relinquish ownership of her three dogs but chose not to.

PETA CALLS FOR RUTGERS UNIVERSITY TO SHUT **DOWN ANIMAL LABS**

PETA has sent a letter to Rutgers President Robert Barchi demanding to know why the school conducts non-critical animal experiments. Numerous studies have shown that animal experimentation wastes resources & lives – as more than 90% of highly promising results from basic scientific research - much of it involving animal testing – fail to lead to treatments for humans. A whistleblower leaked disturbing evidence to PETA that Rutgers suspended all research & implemented a five-stage COVID-19 response plan that involves the euthanasia of animals confined or used in the school's laboratories. Later that day, the homeowners drove from their home in PA to a South Toms River, NJ marina. Upon exiting their vehicle, they heard it -- meowing coming from the car! The kitten made her great escape by running up inside the car engine, and wedged herself in. She traveled all the way from PA to NJ! Several attempts were made to rescue the kitten to no avail and finally, our ACO Maria was called in. With help from the homeowners and many people at the marina, the tire was taken off the car, lots of tools were found for Maria to use, and finally, after two and a half hours, Maria was finally able to free the kitten!

Finny was taken back to AHS/Popcorn Park with Maria where she was cleaned up and vetted. 

DRINK BOTTLE MADE FROM SUSTAINABLE CROPS WILL DECOMPOSE IN ONE YEAR

A new "all plant" drink bottle made from sustainable crops & which can decompose within a year is underway at a Netherlands biochemicals company. The bottle is made from plant sugars instead of traditional fossil fuels. The company behind the effort is Avantium & has found support from Carlsberg who plans to sell a plant-plastic lined cardboard bottle in the future. Coca-Cola & Danone have also backed this product.

TRY SUNSCREENS THAT ARE CRUELTY-FREE AND PROTECT AND PRESERVE CORAL REEFS

Everyone should protect their skin. However, most sunscreen actually contributes to algae bleaching, which is destroying the ocean's coral reefs. Coral reefs are vibrant, diverse ecosystems that provide food, shelter, and protection from predators that help an estimated two million species thrive. They also "protect the coast from erosion and flooding by acting as a buffer against intense waves, protecting homes and natural habitats in the process."

One of the things you can do to protect and preserve coral reefs is use sunscreen that is reef-safe. These sunscreen products are free of chemicals like oxybenzone, octinoxate, parabens, titanium dioxide, and others that are harmful to aquatic life.

KENTUCKY

On April 24, the Governor signed into law KRS Chapter 321 to require that a veterinarian report abuse and to allow immunity for

a good faith report & to allow veterinarians to release information in order to report abuse.

COLORADO

The Colorado Parks & Wildlife Commission has voted to ban killing contests for furbearers such as coyotes, foxes & other small mammals.

VIRGINIA

The North American Veterinary Blood Bank is facing a nation-wide canine blood shortage. Donors must be between 1-7 years old, larger than 50 lbs., current on rabies/distemper vaccine, on flea/heartworm preventatives & never received a blood transfusion. Donors receive a free annual exam and free annual blood work. All that is asked is they donate blood a few times a year. You can register at www.navbb.com. Locations are in Bristow & Richmond, VA.

AGREEMENT FORCES ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY TO ASSESS HARMS TO PROTECTED SPECIES FROM 8 PESTICIDES

Frogs are a species heavily sensitive to the effects of pesticides.

The Center for Biological Diversity & Pesticide Action Network establishes firm deadlines for the Environmental Protection Agency to assess the risks that eight of the nation's most harmful pesticides pose to protected plants & animals. More than 75 million pounds of these weed killers, insecticides, & rat poisons are used every year

across the nation. Under the agreement, the FDA must complete assessments of 4 pesticides and must be finalized by 2024. The EPA's Office of Pesticide Programs has a long history of failing to protect people & the environment from pesticides, including herbicide, etc. A recent EPA "preliminary risk assessment" found that the amount of herbicide atrazine released into the environment in the U.S. is likely harming most species of plants & animals, including mammals, birds, amphibians & reptiles. Atrazine is linked to increased risk of cancer, causes reproductive problems & chemically castrates male frogs even at extremely low concentrations & was banned in the European Union more than a decade ago.


